In an increasingly online world, Idaho's 103 library jurisdict ons might have met the same fate as other "brick and mortar" ent t es facing lower patronage and greater compet t on from Internet-based services, but in fact, Idaho library use has never been higher. In f scal year 2015, there were more than 8.6 million visits to public libraries in Idaho. In f scal year 2014, Idaho libraries had the 5th highest per capita

circulat on of children's materials and at endance at children's programs in the nat on. At endance at young adult programs ranked 7th per capita and has increased 139% over the past five years. While at endance at adult programs was 39th in the nat on, per capita, turnout at adult programs has increased by 40% in Idaho during the past five years. ^a

Role in education

Top priorit es for Idaho's library community are support ng the state's ef orts to improve educat onal at ainment among its K-12 and postsecondary student populat on and support ng the learning of all Idahoans. Libraries play an important educat onal role by:

preparing young children to enter school ready to learn through research-based early literacy and "Read to Me" programs. Once children are in school, the priority of school libraries is to meet students' educational needs from kindergarten through graduate school.

minimizing the summer learning slide for children and teens with reading and outreach programs. In 2016, more than 52,000 Idaho students part cipated in library summer reading programs; another 55,400 were served through library outreach programs.

opt mizing out-of-school t me with access to resources and programs like "Make It at the Library." Given that Idaho students only spend 20% of their waking t me in the classroom, libraries focus on of ering educat onal programming for the rest of students' t me.

support ng lifelong learning and creat ve act vit es of all Idahoans. Library special collect ons provide access to historical photographs, state documents, university historical materials, rare books, digital collect ons, and other primary source materials. Many Idaho libraries are reconf guring their spaces and resources to provide room for Makerspaces in response to patrons' desire to create

room for Makerspaces in respont to patrons' desire to create original content. These spaces are increasingly incorporating technological advances such as coding resources, 3D printing, video editing, and other STEM-
